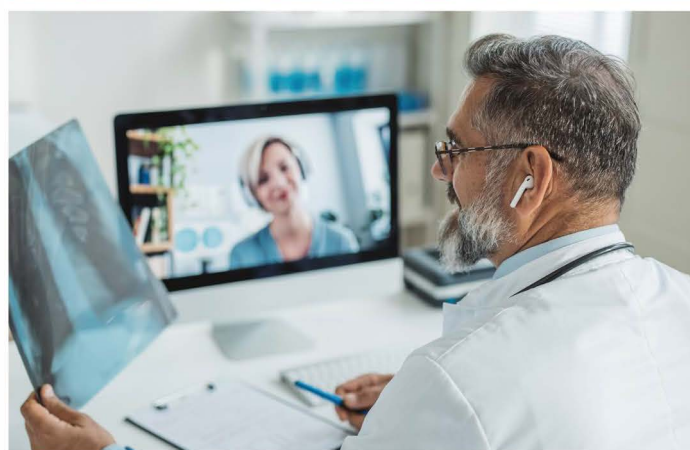

## Philanthropy brings specialized care to rural hospitals

The Rural Health and Virtual Care teams have acquired seven new telemedicine machines thanks to the power of philanthropy. Telemedicine machines virtually connect specialists with patients for treatment — including remote surgical interventions and follow-up care for stroke and heart attacks — increasing the chance of a full recovery. When rural hospitals do not have a specialist on-site, telemedicine machines allow them to **provide community members with care close to home that has lasting impact and saves lives**.

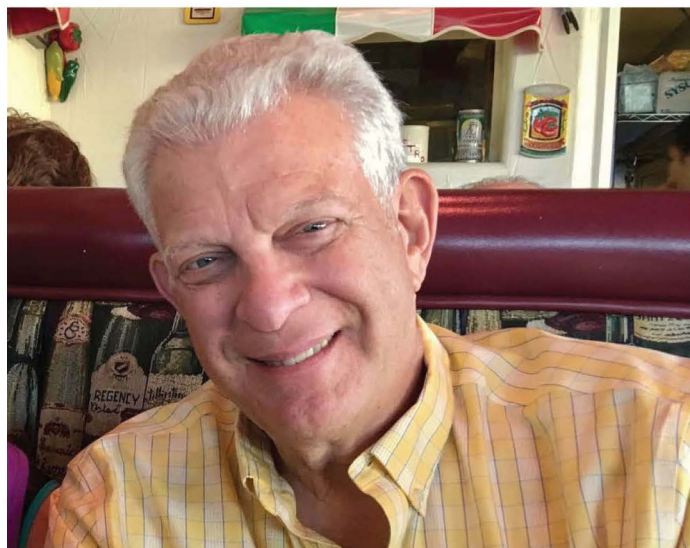




## Preventing traumatic brain injury in our community

**One physician's vision has saved lives and inspired a safer community.** In 2009, after treating countless preventable traumatic brain injuries (TBI), Mark Stern, MD, partnered with Mercy Health Foundation to launch the Gray Matters program. This initiative provides education on TBIs and distributes free helmets across the region. Since its first event, **more than 11,000 helmets have been given away**, and thousands of students learn each year how to protect themselves.

This fall, we mourned the passing of Dr. Stern, who dedicated 25 years to Mercy Hospital before his retirement. The City of Durango honored his profound impact by proclaiming June 16th as "Gray Matters Day." Dr. Stern's work serves as a powerful reminder that a single individual can inspire truly meaningful change. Our foundation proudly carries his legacy forward, continuing to equip our community with helmets and vital TBI education.

## Teams unite across hospitals to deliver uninterrupted care

When Mercy Hospital's LINAC (radiation machine used to treat cancer patients) unexpectedly went offline, **caregivers and donors came together to make sure no patient missed critical treatment.** With the Mercy Health Foundation's support, **52 cancer patients were swiftly transferred to St. Mary-Corwin and Penrose Hospitals for radiation therapy.** Donor-funded resources provided gas cards, hotel stays and other essentials, **easing the burden for families.** Dr. Albert, Mountain Region Executive Director of Oncology, called it "one of the most seamless partnerships I've witnessed."

Our community's compassion is **transforming breast cancer care at Mercy Hospital**. Thanks to generous partners like The Glacier Club and the Dalton Ranch Women's Golf Association, events like Stride for the Cure and Rally for the Cure raised vital support for the Mercy Breast Care Center. Their efforts, and those of countless volunteers, help patients receive expert, whole-person care close to home. Last year alone, the center performed **more than 9,000 mammograms, detecting 138 cases of breast cancer**. We're building a stronger, healthier future for women in the Four Corners region.
